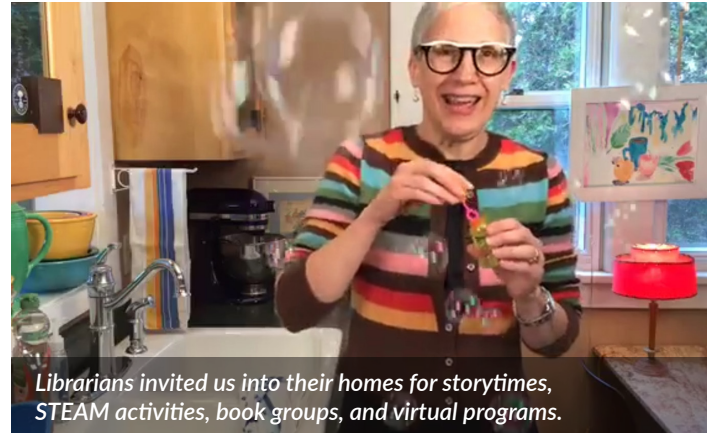


A YEAR IN REVIEW

Annual reports typically state and evaluate performance based on standard industry metrics—those familiar visitor, circulation, attendance, program, and resource metrics. We share some of that information here and are proud to report that the Library again earned a national three-star award ranking from Library Journal in January 2021, based, in part, on those metrics.

This year, however, we are measuring our success a little differently. The FY2021 performance review reveals a Library that did more than just survive. It thrived during a year like none we have ever experienced, discovering new and meaningful ways to connect with its community.

Although, the physical building was closed for the month of May 2020 and the level of physical access to the Library fluctuated from June 2020 through June 2021 due to COVID, our commitment to deliver the highest level of library services to the Lake Forest community, however, never wavered.

Despite the significant disruption to operations, these highlights reflect a Library committed to its mission:

- ▶ Signature events, such as *Read Between the Ravines* and *Lake Forest Reads* were held, continuing and

supporting community conversations around the opioid crisis, mental health, systemic racism, and immigration.

- ▶ *1000 Books Before Kindergarten*, STEAM programs, summer and winter reading programs, and other youth literacy projects were launched or enhanced.
- ▶ The Young Adult Advisory Board completed its diversity audit of the Young Adult/Teen collection and remained connected through virtual programming.

Although there seems to be little precedent for you to have followed, you've done the hard research to create a safe and effective library, while also creating a fun and educational online set of programs for the community. Hats off to you!

Equally as important, the Library continued to move forward significant operational projects, including the migration to Office 365, development and installation of the beta self-check option, migration to fiber internet, release of the RFID RFP, and preliminary work to update the phone system. These steps continue to position the Library to deliver library services more effectively. Whether it was:

- ▶ handing out books and other materials on the back dock,
- ▶ delivering materials to homes,
- ▶ answering reference and reader's advisory questions by phone, email, text, chat, social media, and in-person around town,
- ▶ adding remote access to databases and hundreds of copies of eBooks,

- ▶ reimagining the Library's website as a resource for accurate and up-to-date COVID information and easier access to Library news,
- ▶ leveraging the Library's social media channels to amplify messages from other community organizations,
- ▶ developing homeschooling and entertainment resource guides during the stay-at-home orders,
- ▶ hosting 24/7 Wi-Fi in the courtyards and parking lot,
- ▶ making it easier to get a library card by issuing and renewing cards online,
- ▶ delivering high quality virtual programming and providing grab-and-go kits to enhance the experience of a virtual program, or
- ▶ creating personalized reading care packages and lists—

the Library proved it was so much more than a building.

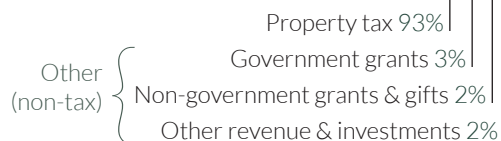

We are proud of what we accomplished with you this year and look forward to seeing you in the Library.

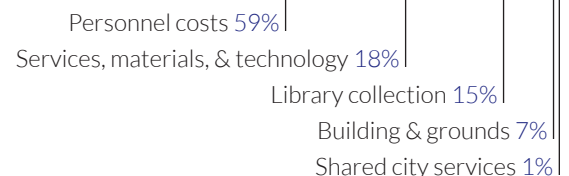

\$3,708,468

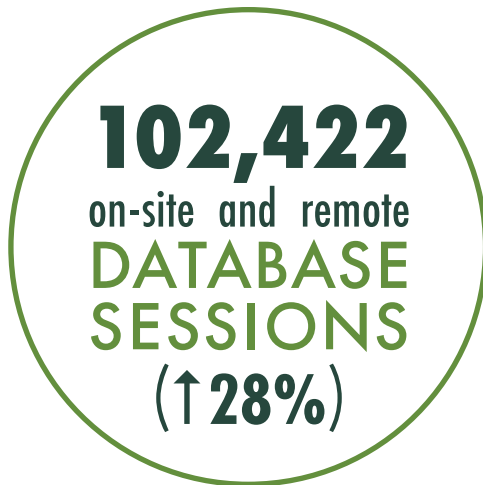




- 2,821 grab-and-go activity or storytime kits provided for children, teens, and adults

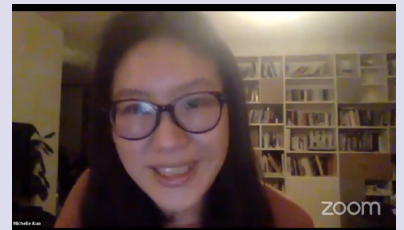

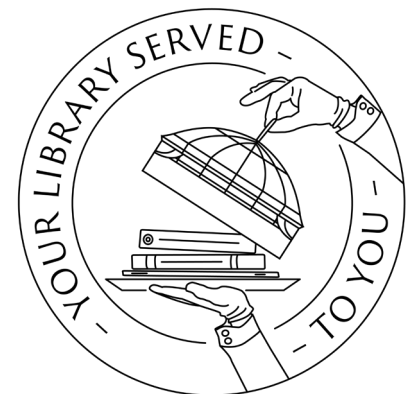
